- The following are adapted from the defunct 2007 English National Curriculum levels for Citizenship.
- ☐ These levels are aimed at students in Grades 3-10
- These levels are expected to be modified to suit individual schools but please share any better versions
- Assume that most students eg: 60% or so of a typical cohort will reach Level 4 by the end of Grade 5 and around 20% will be below and 20% above
- These levels are designed to assess a portfolio of work rather than individual assignments
- ☐ Most students (60% or so) should reach Level 6 by the end of Grade 8
- ☐ It may be appropriate to use progression levels for history/geography/Indonesian culture/language instead depending on the task
- Part B contains a sample grading outline for reporting to parents. It assumes schools are using the IB levels 1-7 to report to parents
